3.3 FRACKING

SUSTAINABILITY THEME

At Environment

OBJECTIVES

This policy will advise on decision making processes on behalf of the City in relation to oil and gas exploration and extraction initiatives within the City.

POLICY STATEMENT

The City does not support the use of fracking or similar extraction methods for oil and gas extraction or mining on unconsolidated land within the jurisdiction of the City. A formal position has not been drawn.

POLICY DETAILS

1. In respect to current and future proposals for onshore petroleum or other extractive industries:
 - 1.1. Support the community in their opposition to fracking regarding any decisions on onshore oil and gas extraction; in decision making on matters relating to these developments;
 - 1.2. Support and advocate for the rights of communities and residents within the City to clean water, clean air and enjoyment of land without pollution or nuisance;
 - 1.3. Encourage local business owners (including individuals, businesses in agriculture, pastoral, agricultural and horticultural, fishing and tourism businesses) to continue to oppose and demonstrate opposition to oil and gas extraction initiatives;
 - 1.4. Encourage local business owners to afford the highest priority in decision making by the City and its Councils;
 - 1.5. Encourage local business owners to demonstrate leadership in environmental sustainability.

KEY TERM DEFINITION

Hydraulic fracturing, commonly referred to as fracking, is a method used by the oil and gas industry to increase the rate and total amount of oil and gas extracted from reservoirs.


